A New Leaf, Inc.	A New Leaf provided emergency shelter services to domestic violence victims at Autumn House and Faith House, homeless families at La Mesita and homeless single men at the East Valley Men's Center.
Adelante Healthcare, Inc.	Medical and dental care.
André House of Arizona	The grant award supported both our evening meal that we serve to people who are homeless, as well as our transitional housing program.
Area Agency on Aging, Region One, Incorporated	The CFC Special Funding Initiative award funds supported the home delivered meals programs in three communities; Mesa, Sun City, and Glendale.
Arizona Community Action Association	ACAA's grant award was used for shelter services. Specifically, for rent and mortgage assistance.
Association of Arizona Food Banks(AAFB)	Food
Central Arizona Shelter Services (CASS)	CASS provides emergency shelter to homeless single adults, families and children at a cost of \$22.06 per night.
Chicanos Por La Causa, Inc.	De Colores used the funds for program support which included support of a child development specialist. As part of Basic Needs, CPLC used the funds for primarily food assistance and immediate needs related to medicine and transportation.
Child Crisis Center (CCC)	We provided temporary shelter in a safe, homelike environment to 150 children for 12,731 nights. Services included food, crisis support, medical care and educational support.
Chrysalis Shelter for Victims of Domestic Violence, Inc.	The Shelter Services Program which provide safe, congregate housing in two confidential shelter facilities, trauma counseling, case management, client advocacy and child care. Residents may also receive lay legal and victim advocacy services, if needed.
Community Information & Referral	Community Information & Referral provided callers with referrals to emergency food, rent and/or utility assistance, shelter, housing and transportation services.
Community Services of Arizona	This funding was used for emergency rental payments to prevent evictions.

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Crisis Nursery, Inc.	Emergency shelter was available 24/7 to families with children ages 0-10. Upon admission, children's basic needs of shelter, food, clothing, health care and supervision were met while parents were connected with needed community resources.
Desert Mission	CFC funds helped us provide basic medical care to uninsured children and their families. Funds also supported a resource coordinator to provide community resource information to families, and to help them enroll in public assistance programs.
Florence Crittenton Services of Arizona	Florence Crittenton provided basic needs services in the areas of food, shelter, utilities, and emergency assistance. Administrative and direct program salary/ere, mileage and cell phone reimbursements were supported by the grant award as well.
Homeward Bound	Homeward Bound received assistance for housing.
JFCS (Jewish Family and Children's Service)	Basic needs supported were rent/mortgage/utilities and medical (prescriptions). There was less need than predicted for aid with prescriptions since after Prop. 100 passed the anticipated number of persons who would lose their insurance did not occur.
Labor's Community Service Agency	With the Basic Needs Collaborative funding we were able provide additional rent and utility assistance to households facing crisis situations.
Lodestar Day Resource Center	The grant allowed LDRC to maintain our intake department. Through engagement and excellent customer service, client coordinators connect homeless individuals to basic needs, life-saving and life-changing services, & ultimately to permanent housing.
Maggie's Place	All of the basic needs services described in our initial application were supported in part by the grant award.
Mission of Mercy Mobile Health Clinic	Direct medical services and prescription medications for the uninsured and underinsured.
Neighborhood Christian Clinic	The Neighborhood Christian Clinic provides medical and dental services to the uninsured, underserved community.
Neighbors Who Care	The program ensures that homebound elderly in Sun Lakes and south Chandler communities have access to basic needs. Services include dinner delivery and transportation via the agency's van or a volunteer's vehicle to obtain food and healthcare.

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New Life Center	The Domestic Violence Emergency Shelter Services program includes residential services with all day-to-day living needs, case management, individual and group advocacy, jobs coordination, transportation, and children's services.
Paz de Cristo	The funding received from the Basic Needs Funding Collaborative supported our Daily Evening Meal Service and our Food Box program.
Phoenix Indian Center (PIC)	Rent/Utilities aid and Emergency Assistance were supported by the Funding Collaborative. 97 Households received assistance: 21 with rent aid; and 76 with Emergency Assistance.
Phoenix Rescue Mission (PRM)	The basic needs services supported by the grant award were emergency food boxes and congregate meals -- both of which served homeless and low-income individuals and families.
Phoenix Shanti Group, Inc.	The grant award completely supported our shelter housing program.
Save the Family Foundation of AZ	Six transitional housing units, case management (partial cost for 1 case manager serving approximately 23 families), workshops, support groups for homeless families and employment search and retention services for adults was supported.
Sojourner Center	Food and shelter.
St. Joseph the Worker	Funds supported SJW's Job Development, Placement and Retention Program, providing personal job development assistance, education, basic resources and long-term support services to help homeless and other disadvantaged individuals gain employment.
St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance	The grant award supported our Emergency Food Box program. This program ensures that families in crisis receive a three day supply of nutritious food.
Tempe Community Action Agency	TCAA utilized VSUW Basic Needs Program funds for our Utility/Rental Assistance program. TCAA was able to extend the hours of a part-time Rent Utility Specialist to full-time status from June 1, 2009 to June 30, 2010.

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The Respite Shelter for Homeless Men, Inc.	The following services were provided:1.Shelter,food,clothing. 2.Transportation to and from medical and social service appointments. 3.Case mgmt. to meet physical, social, and financial goals.4.Help applying for benefits,employment,and housing.
The Salvation Army	We have provided services in basic needs as well as food delivery. Assistance such as food, shelter/housing, rent/utilities, transportation, and mass feeding, as described in our initial application, were supported by the grant award.
The WellCare Foundation	WellCare provided free integrated healthcare services to uninsured, working mothers and their children. WellCare's comprehensive services included nursing and doctor visits, dental care as well as laboratory and radiology.
Tumbleweed Center for Youth Development	219 Youth were provided emergency shelter and care in a licensed group home. Each youth received basic needs, recreation, individual, group and family counseling. The Basic needs grant funded a portion of unfunded per day cost.
UMOM New Day Centers, Inc.	The grant supported our Emergency Shelter Program.
United Food Bank (UFB)	The basic needs services that United Food Bank provided and was supported by the grant award was Food Delivery.
